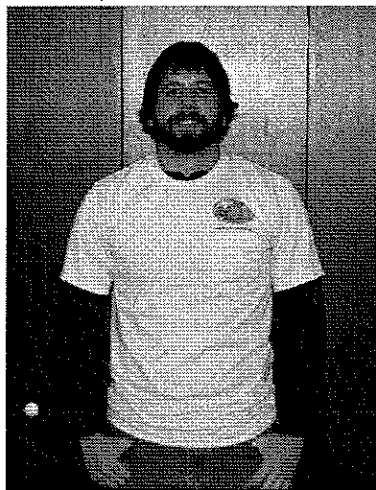

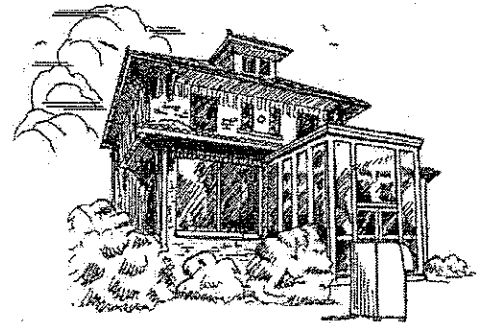
## Mary Meuser Library Calendar Of Events

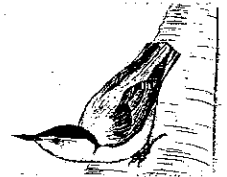

- Annual Butterfly Census Saturday, June 27th from 9:00am to Noon. Help us count the butterflies in Mariton's meadows. Even if you don't know any butterflies, you will leave knowing at least 3. Bring binoculars
- Nature Day Camps: This year the theme is Earth Sciences. The camp runs from 9:00am to Noon each day. We will explore outside each day, unless the weather is miserable. ## A Letter From The Wilson Area School Superintendent

The Wilson Area School District was recently presented with Keystone Achievement Awards by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. These awards are given to public Schools that have achieved adequate yearly progress for two consecutive years. We are pleased to report all five buildings received an award for meeting AYP Standards in the 2006-07 and 2007-08 school years. I am always proud to inform our public that our schools have been achieving this level of performance since the 2003-04 school year. The Keystone Achievement Award is just another indicator of the tremendous effort of our students, teachers and staff, who have set high academic expectations for our District.

To guide the work of our schools in helping to ensure we continue to achieve a high level of performance, our school district developed a six year strategic plan earlier this fall. The plan shows in detail how the District intends to incorporate the standards adopted by the State Board of Education into the curriculum. The District's new strategic plan is a result of many hours of hard work by representatives of our school community. Students, parents, community leaders, board members and administrators actively participated in the development of the Strategic Plan. We would like to thank everyone who served on a Strategic Plan Committee for their dedication and commitment to our students and District.

The 2009-10 District Preliminary Budget stands at 33.4 million dollars; it represents a 1.5 mill increase or a 3.06% tax increase. This will increase the District's overall millage rate from 48.9 mills to 50.4 mills. The preliminary budget continues to provide quality educational opportunities for our students while minimizing the impact on taxpayers who fund and support our programs. The Budget supports several priorities. These include revising the K-8 Science program, establishment of a new high school business courses, and debt for the construction of the new intermediate building. The proposed preliminary budget also includes support for maintaining elementary class size guidelines and the continued appropriate placement of students with special needs. Moreover, the budget continues to provide the maximum tax relief of \$650.00 through the Real Estate Tax Rebate Program.

## Frys Run Watershed Association News

Since the last newsletter the Frys Run Watershed Association (FRWA) has completed the Frys Run Cold-water Conservation Watershed Plan. Some copies of the plan are available at the Williams Township Municipal Office. Other activities toward implementation of the plan recommendations have included:

- Starting a volunteer watershed monitoring program with the help of Moravian College Professor Frank Kuserk and several of his students. They conducted a watershed assessment and sampling at three sites along Frys Run. A report on their findings will be available soon.
- A watershed monitoring workshop was held on November 1st at which professor Frank Kuserk and his students showed the participants how to assess the watershed habitat and sample for macroinvertebrate.
- An indoor watershed workshop on macroinvertebrate identification is being planned for some time in February or March to help us better identify the creatures we obtain in our sampling. For more info contact Matt Powers at 484-373-0987.
- A spring workshop on water monitoring will be held on Saturday, April 18 at 10:00am in the Frys Run Park, at the corner of Route 611 and Royal Manor Road—Keep an eye out for further information.

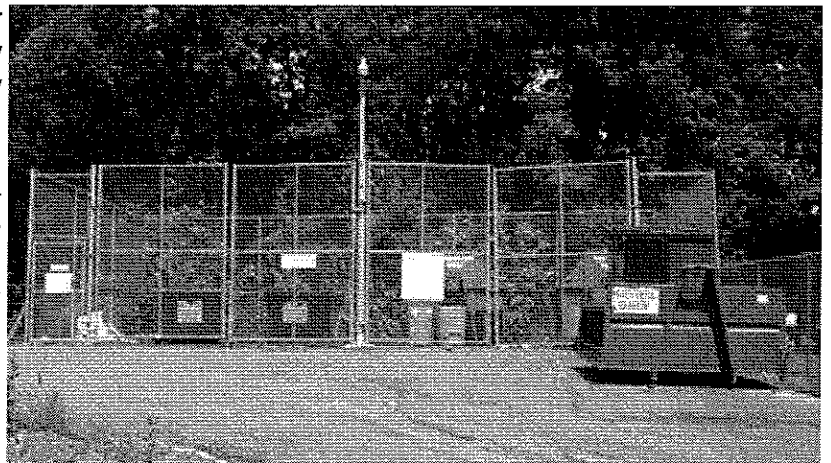
## A few reminders from Public Works

Please do not place any garbage bags or garbage cans out for collection within the public roadway. Garbage is to be placed curbside, in your yard, or in your driveway for pickup. Any garbage hit by traffic, snow plows, or snow will be the homeowners responsibility to clean up. Your garbage carrier will walk onto your property to collect your garbage.

Please remember that there is no parking on any road or street after the start of a winter storm and until the storm has stopped and all snow has been removed from the roadway. This has become more of a problem this winter season compared to last. Ordinance 2002-7 covers this issue and allows cars in violation to be towed at owners expense. Any complaints of cars being plowed in or damages to vehicles incurred during snow storms will be referred to the Ordinance. For a copy of this ordinance, please contact the Municipal Office at 610-258-6788.

There has been a problem at the recycling center, located at 2300 Morgan Hill Road with people leaving their garbage and other non-recyclables at this site. Please keep the following in mind if you use the recycling center:

- The site is for recyclable products only: Newspaper, cardboard, plastic, heavy metal, aluminum and tin cans.
- If you are bringing aluminum cans, tin cans, or plastic bottles please dump the recyclables into the appropriate containers. Whatever container you bring recyclables in, please remember to take it with you after placing your recyclables in the appropriate containers.
- Break down all cardboard, crush aluminum cans and plastic bottles to put them into containers. By doing so this allows for more room for recycling products. Please do not throw these recycling products on the ground.
- Glass is not to be left at the recycling center at any time! The Boy Scouts recycle glass every second Saturday of the month. Please do not drop off your glass if recycling center is cancelled due to bad weather.
- Ordinance number 2003-1 requires all residents and businesses to recycle through a hauler and/or a drop off center. Our drop off center is for recyclable products only. Please do not drop off your everyday garbage as the Township has no way of disposal. If you do not have a garbage hauler please contact one of the following: Allied Waste, Berger Sanitation Inc., Chrin Hauling, Delguericos, TH Hauling, Petersons, Rariton Valley & Swint for collection of household garbage.
- The recycling center and maintenance area is now under twenty four hour surveillance. Anyone identified illegally dumping garbage other than previously listed recyclables will be prosecuted for illegal dumping. As a reminder glass is only recycled the second Saturday of every month.
- Please use the Recycling Center responsibly. By doing so, this will allow our recycling center to remain open without supervision. The Township is dedicated to recycling and we ask all Township residents to help keep "Williams Township Clean".



## Land Preservation Board

The Williams Township Land Preservation Board continues to work with State, County and private funding sources to obtain grants to conserve property and expand open space in the Township.

At the State level, the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (CDNR) Community Conservation Partnership Program has grants to purchase a perpetual conservation easement on qualified land. Generally a 50% match is required from another source such as County or Township funds. DCNR prefers projects involving woodlands and land with natural resources/features. A prerequisite for DCNR grants is that the landowner agrees to allow public access to the preserved land(s).

Northampton County has several programs under its Open Space initiative targeting projects such as environmentally sensitive areas as well as urban and rural parks. The Township has presented proposals for funding for properties that we feel have natural or environmentally sensitive characteristics worth preserving. The County, like the State, is looking for the landowner to provide some form of public access in exchange for the public funds invested.

In addition the County has a Farmland Preservation Program to purchase conservation easements on actively farmed land in the County. To date, several farming families in Williams Township have been approved and funded by the County's Farmland Preservation Program.

The Township also works closely with local conservancies such as Heritage Conservancy, Natural Lands Trust and Wildlands Conservancy to tap their extensive knowledge on best practices in conservation, and keep abreast of current or pending legislation and trends in governmental support. We also ask their assistance in such projects as natural features inventory studies on a land owners property as part of the analysis and application preparation process. We have sought their assistance in completing and submitting landowners applications to both State and County programs.

Finally, several landowners in the Township are in the process of donating their land to the open space program. There are possible tax benefits from such a private conservation easement transaction, but individuals should consult expert tax advice when contemplating such a donation.

If you are interested in preserving your land in the Township, the first step is to submit an application. Detailed information and applications are available on the Townships web site under the Land Preservation section or contact the Municipal Office. ## Zoning Office Reminder

Please be aware that many homes in Williams Township have not complied with House Identification Ordinance 2002-9. This Ordinance requires all Williams Township residents to prominently display identification numbers which mark the location of the residents and businesses for Fire, Police, Ambulance and other personnel involved in providing emergency services. This is necessary in order to ensure the health, safety and welfare of the residents of Williams Township. Throughout Williams Township there are many homes not visible from the road, and are not properly identified. We are all concerned about this situation, because a lack of proper identification makes it very difficult for emergency services to respond to your home. If you are interested, we have numbers and plates available for sale at the Municipal Office at a cost of \$10.00. The numbers are reflective and will aid in properly identifying your home. We ask all Williams Township residents and businesses to please help us, help you. We thank you for your anticipated cooperation and help.

It's time to update the Williams Township Park and Recreation Plan! Williams Township is asking its residents for their opinion. The Recreation Board will begin work on updating the 1999 Park and Recreation Plan this winter. In order to produce a plan that responds to the needs and wishes of Township residents, a survey will be conducted. The Park and Recreation Public Opinion Survey will be posted on the Township website and a printed copy will be available at the Township office. Please take the time to complete a survey reflecting the opinion of your household to help us with the Plan preparation.

The Board of Supervisors approved Tina Fiorino to fill the Recreation Board's vacant seat. Since Tina has been so active in PTA and the Athletic Association already she will be a big asset to the Board.

The Summer Recreation Program will run from Monday, June 22nd through Friday, July 31st from 8:30am to 3:30pm daily, weather permitting. This program is for children ages 5 through 13. When registering a five year old child, you must show a copy of their birth certificate.

The Home Run Derby will be held on Wednesday, June 3rd. Last year there were 125 participants at the Derby! Both boys and girls are welcome!

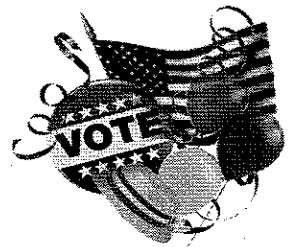
